First Quarter 2013 Speaker Reviews

AGENT ORANGE

On February 26, the Section welcomed Dr. Ray Maddalone to talk about his involvement with the at-sea incineration of Agent Orange in the late 1970s. Dr. Maddalone, a retired employee from Northrop Grumman Corporation, presented a lively talk complete with fabulous pictures of the Bikini Atoll, the incineration ship M/T Volcanus as well as the Agent Orange storage facilities. Dr. Maddalone gave the audience a perspective on the creation of Agent Orange, its manufacture and the issues surrounding the disposal of this substance. He involved the audience in his descriptions and schematics of the incinerator and the incineration details. A terrific discussion with the audience closed up the presentation. Many thanks to Dr. Maddalone for coming to share his experiences.

PATENT LAW

On March 26, the Section teamed up with Macharri Vorndran-Jones from the Eli Lilly Patent Law Division to talk about the America Invents Act (AIA) and its implications. On March 15 of this year, the AIA went into effect allowing for a major revamping of the United States patent system. The biggest change was that the United States moved from a "first to invent" system to a "first to file" system. This change brings the United States into harmony with the patent system of the European Union and others. Ms. Vorndran-Jones laid out many of the changes in the system and the implications of those changes for the inventor: from large companies to the smallest home inventor. Her presentation was punctuated with lots of discussion within the audience about the pluses and minuses of this new system. The audience was fortunate to have four law students in the group. The Section would like to thank Ms. Vorndran-Jones for taking the initiative to present and discuss these changes.

May 7 Awards Night Banquet Speaker

Dr. Scott M. Sheehan

Our speaker for the May 7 Awards Night banquet is Dr. Scott M. Sheehan who is Senior Director of Molecular Design and Lead Generation Technologies at Lilly Research Labs. Dr. Sheehan will speak on the topic of "Discovery Chemistry in Pharmaceutical Research".

Dr. Sheehan has been at Eli Lilly and Company for fourteen years. His path to Lilly started by getting his Bachelor's degree from Worcester Polytechnic University, a trip to Emory University for his Ph.D. and finally a tour of duty at Harvard for his Post Doc. He started at Lilly as a Senior Organic Chemist working on cardiovascular targets. He quickly moved up the ladder and spent time as the Head of Neurodegeneration, managing chemists involved in targets like Alzheimer's. Dr. Sheehan's ability to lead in new technologies led to his appointment as Director of Fragment-Based Drug Discovery utilizing cutting edge techniques to find new starting points for medchem projects. Dr. Sheehan is currently the Senior Director responsible for developing new lead generation strategies and technologies. In addition, to his technical knowledge, Dr. Sheehan is well known for his ability to enable highly capable teams and bring a personal touch to his groups.

2013 Indiana Section ACS Scholarship

EXAMINATIONS - OVERVIEW

Below are the results of the 2013 Indiana Section ACS Scholarship and USNCO Exam held at Butler University on Saturday, March 2, 2013. There were a total of 221 students who took the exam (of 274 nominated): 112 (of 134 nominated) took the first year exam (average score 25/60), 70 (of 83 nominated) took the advanced exam (average score 37/60), and an additional 39 (of 56 nominated) students who took the exam solely to compete for a spot on the United States National Chemistry Olympiad team (average score 35/60).

Students who scored high on the exam were contacted and invited to participate in the second phase of the USNCO competition, which was a written exam plus a practical laboratory exam held at Butler University on Saturday, April 13, 2013. These students are also listed below. Our goal was to get Hoosier students to qualify for the three-week USNCO camp at the United States Air Force Academy from which the USNCO team will be chosen.

The award banquet, to celebrate the accomplishments of the winning students, will begin at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 7, 2013 in the Krannert Room of Clowes Hall on the campus of Butler University


