Update on the 2013 Fall National American Chemical Society (ACS) Meeting in Indianapolis

Preparations are well underway for the Fall 2013 National Meeting of the ACS in Indianapolis. The National Meeting Lead Team has made significant progress this fall in terms of planning and organizing. There are three main updates to share:

- 1. The Indiana Section aggressively marketed the Indianapolis ACS meeting during the Fall 2012 National Meeting in Philadelphia and will do so again at the Spring 2013 New Orleans Meeting. the "VisitIndy" In partnership with organization, we presented a booth in the Philadelphia ACS Exhibition Hall, staffed by our own Section members. There was a strong interest in the 2013 Fall Meeting, and to generate even more interest, we auctioned off some 1/10-size model Indy Racing Vehicles (race cars and MotoGP motorcycles). We are recruiting for volunteers to staff the Exhibition Hall booth at the upcoming New Orleans Meeting. - 2. In a recent development this fall, we jumped on the opportunity for a joint collaboration with Celebrate Science Indiana for a public outreach Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM)-event at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway (IMS) on Sunday, September 8, 2013. The event will be unique as it provides two outstanding experiences at one worldrenowned venue - in one day! For the scientific education communities of central Indiana and the ACS, we will produce a STEM outreach event at the IMS. The now wellestablished Celebrate Science Indiana (division of SEFI, Science Education Foundation of

Science Indiana (division of SEFI, Science Education Foundation of Indiana) event with more than two hundred fifty presenters of interactive K-12 STEM-related experiences will take center stage. This will be augmented by the ACS Committee on Community Affairs presentation of interactive chemistry experiences, ACS National and Local Exhibitors presenting their STEM-related programming linked to the "Chemistry in Motion" theme, and the IMS's STEM programs featuring local/national companies working in areas related to car racing (fuels, materials, racing-related components).

3. As a part of the September 8 public outreach event, an IMS track lap will also be offered to ACS members and their guests, in order to provide an "Indy Racing Experience" with one track lap in a pace car, followed by a picture with an Indy 500 race car (offered as a paid ACS special event ticket). ACS members will have the unique opportunity to meet race car drivers, racing teams, and get pictures with an Indy 500 race car. The track laps will be included in the ACS National Meeting registration process in the spring of 2013.

We would like to encourage all ACS members in the State of Indiana to find a way to attend or participate in the 2013 Fall National Meeting in Indianapolis. Please start making your plans now to either present or attend the meeting. Abstract submission will open in early spring 2013, and we would like to see as many Indiana-based technical presentations as possible. There will also be many professional development activities in which to participate. We look forward to your participation in ALL aspects of the Fall 2013 ACS National Meeting in Indianapolis!

St. Vincent Playroom Project Opening Day!

As we described in the September 2012 edition of the Accelerator, a team of volunteers from the Indiana ACS Section recently remodeled the waiting room in the Michigan Road Peyton Manning St Vincent Children's hospital. This transformed the waiting room from a drab and uninteresting room into a colorful chemistrythemed playroom. The project was funded by an ACS local Section Innovative Project Grant (IPG), obtained by our 2012 Section Chair, Sibel Selcuk. Sibel said she was determined to use the funding for a project with lasting impact. "I wanted to come up with something that would remind people that chemistry is part of their lives," she explained. "I particularly like to work with children, because if we can get them excited about chemistry, that's the best contribution that we can make to the profession." She sketched out a plan to create the chemistry-themed playroom to foster learning and awareness of the role of science in people's lives, particularly in health care.

During two weekends this summer, volunteers replaced the original dreary décor in the waiting room of the St. Vincent Medical Group pediatric office in Zionsville, Indiana. They painted the walls a multitude of vibrant colors and covered them with games as well as images of molecules and other information. Each wall tells a different story. The flu wall, for instance, tells the story of a flu virus and describes chemistry's role in flu shots, and the green wall offers information

about recycling and green chemistry. Business Furniture donated furniture and toys, Leaf Software Solutions contributed two iPads programmed with chemistry-related games, and ISF Sign Specialists donated wall decals.

The newly-themed playroom received its official Opening Day on October 23, and featured a visit by Indianapolis Mayor, Gregory A. Ballard. Sam Wendel, chief mad scientist with Mad Science of

North Central Indiana and a retired chemist, educated KIPP Indianapolis College Preparatory students and other guests with lively chemistry demonstrations. ACS Board Chair William F. Carroll Jr. and Brad McNabb, chief operations officer of St. Vincent Medical Group, officiated and also helped carry out a playful demonstration. The playroom has been a hit with visitors, Selcuk says. One little boy walked in and began screaming, "Wow, cool, chemistry!"

2012 National Chemistry Week (NCW) Report

The Indiana Section of the American Chemical Society sponsored the annual National Chemistry Week celebration at the Indianapolis Children's Museum on Saturday, November 3rd 2012 from 10 AM to 3 PM. This year's theme was "nanotechnology: The smallest BIG idea in science" and the celebration provided a full day of fun, exciting chemistry activities and events that showcased the contributions of nanoscience to the environment, energy, materials and our health!

This year's publicity efforts were very successful and included advertising for the event through WFYI public radio, local news event calendars and flyers distributed to museum visitors on the day of the event. We were fortunate to have about 250 ACS volunteers who came to help make the event a success. We ran out of gift bags for guests within an hour of the event opening, exhausting our supply of six hundred! There were plenty of activities for the guests! Guy Hansen and his Chemistry is a Blast team from Eli Lilly & Company delighted and thrilled over six hundred guests with four shows demonstrating the fun and explosive nature of chemistry. Jaclyn Barrett and her Kids in Chemistry team provided five workshops for kids to learn how to make Jiggle Jelly, while "Mad Scientist" Sam Wendel excited children about chemistry with his hands-on activities. In addition to these events, volunteers from Dow AgroSciences, The American Institute for Chemical Engineers, AIT Laboratories, Ball State University, Butler University, DePauw University, Lancaster Laboratories, Martin University, Trine University and the University of Indianapolis provided interactive experiments and demonstrations that enhanced the audience's understanding of how nanoscience applies to everyday life.

The activities on Saturday were kicked-off with an awards ceremony honoring the winners of the high school competition, t-shirt design contest, and the canned food drive. Seven high schools participated in a competition by either presenting papers or making videos with skits and performing experiments that incorporated the 2012 theme. Prizes included three hundred dollars for the schools, plus trophies, ACS certificates and plagues for the students. The video submissions were judged according to the following criteria: a) use of the theme "Behind the Scenes with Chemistry" b) innovation c) hands-on activities and d) teamwork. All of the schools did an excellent job, which made judging a real challenge! Ultimately, the following were selected as winners:

•Lisa Bowles won a first-place plaque for the High School paper competition.

•Upper Room Co-Op School won first place for the High School video competition.

There was a great response from area fifth- and sixth-grade elementary students who participated in a contest to design this year's NCW t-shirt logo. Malik Stewart (sixth grade) and Rayna Bowles (fifth grade) from Kipp Indy school made the incredible drawings that won the t-shirt competition, which was judged according to use of the theme and creativity.



Finally, this year's canned food drive was a great success with a large response from Indiana University and the local ACS members. On Thanksgiving Day, all the canned food was donated to a food bank in Bloomington, Indiana.

The NCW committee would like to express our gratitude to the ACS volunteers, local companies and educational institutions which came together to help make this year's event a grand success! We also extend a very special thank you to the staff at the Children's Museum of Indianapolis who helped us coordinate such an outstanding event!
